# **Prone to Wander**



Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, prone to leave the God I love...

You may recognize those words from the hymn "Come Thou Fount". And- as with many of the hymns- there is a story behind the song.

The song was written by a man named Robert Robinson. Robinson lost his father as a young boy of 8 and was then sent, at age 14, to learn a trade as a barber's apprentice. His mother had hopes that he would one day be a priest however, Robinson fell in with a rough crowd and began to live a life far from those hopes and dreams. One day- with the intent of disrupting a church gathering- Robinson was touched by a sermon he heard at that gathering. It was a sermon on "the coming wrath of God" delivered by George Whitfield (one of the founders of Methodism). Robinson felt that God was directly speaking to him and soon after gave his life over to God. Robinson then became a preacher himself and, at the tender age of 23, wrote

this now-famous hymn. However, that's not the end of the story.

Many years later it's reported that Robinson once again returned to previous behaviors and wandered away from Christ. (And I can't help but wonder if the story wouldn't have been different had the message he heard that day been one of hope and love. If instead of "wrath" he had been met with the truth that God deeply loved him. But I digress...)

One day, during this time, he found himself on a stagecoach. We're told that the only other passenger was a woman who began singing the hymn Come Thou Fount, the very hymn Robinson had written. She began to talk to him about how this hymn spoke to her heart. but Robinson didn't want to talk about it. He didn't want to enter into a discussion of this hymn penned by a younger man whose faith was on fire. It was a painful reminder. But the woman persisted. Finally, Robinson broke down into tears and told the woman that he was the one who wrote the song. He said:

happy man who wrote that hymn many years ago, and I would give a thousand worlds, if I had them, to enjoy the feelings I had then." Gently, she replied, "Sir, the 'streams of mercy' are still flowing."

"streams of mercy are still flowing" Having come face to face with God's grace (and please note that God's grace is often delivered through human agents) Robinson turned back to Jesus that day and his ministry continued. You could even say that it continues to this day in the form of this hymn that was left to us.

The words in this song are something we can all relate to. We strive to follow Jesus, but sometimes it feels like we're driving a car that is out of alignment. Even Paul says (in his letter to the Romans) "I do not understand what I do. I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate." (Romans 7:15)

As we journey with Jesus this Lent, we will do so in the

company of our friend and brother, Peter We'll explore the highs and lows of Peter's journey with Jesus.

It seems that Peter and Robinson had a lot in common with each other and truly- with us as well. Our journey with Jesus has 'mountain top' experiences as well as time spent wandering in the valley. We too have, at some point, said 'yes' to following Christ and yet have found ourselves denying the very One whom we have committed to following. This is part of the very real life of faith that we lead. It is part of the journey we find ourselves on. But it's only when we acknowledge our difficulties that we can be strengthened all over again. And it's only when we are honest about these within community that we can strengthen one another. Remember when Jesus predicted Peter's denial He said: "... but I have prayed for you that your own faith may not fail, and you, when once you have turned back, strengthen your brothers." (Luke 22:32) Each week we'll look at a different snapshot of Peter's

journey with Jesus and, as we do this, 'Come Thou Fount' will be 'playing in the background.' (so to speak)

Peter's journey as well as this hymn resonate with us because they are true. They are real. We praise, we wander, we hope, and- in the end, surrender our hearts to God. Because truly, God has been holding on to them for us the whole time just as God held Peter, and Robinson, and all who have gone before us and who will forever come after us. "Streams of mercy, never ceasing."

May you know the depth and breadth and height of God's love for you. May you carry that knowledge with you on this journey.

Dear Trinity Kids, Happy Valentine's Day! It's Valentine's Day on the day that I'm writing this.

It's not Valentine's Day on the day you are reading this.

That's ok. I still wish you a Happy Valentine's Day.

This year Valentine's Day is the same day as the start of the church season of Lent. (What is Lent?) Lent is the church season (40 days not counting Sundays) leading up to Easter. (Why don't we count Sundays?) so glad you asked... Sundays aren't counted in Lent because each Sunday IS like a mini-Easter. Each Sunday we celebrate that Jesus is alive. We give thanks that even though Jesus died (and that was sad) He was resurrected and lives now.

(But what does Valentine's Day have to do with this?)... well...Usually nothing. BUT every now and again (roughly 3 times a century) Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday (the start of Lent) fall on the same day. And that is pretty cool because both those days have a lot to do with love.

On Valentine's Day, we celebrate love between people. Very often people will give one another Valentine's cards and/ or flowers or sweet treats as a way to say 'I love you' or at least 'I really like you and I want to be your friend.' It's so nice to be reminded that others around us want to know us

and want us to know them as well. This is what it means to be in a relationship with someone else. It means you want to spend time with that person getting to know them and for them to know you!

Now the amazing thing is that this is true of God as well. God wants to spend time with us and wants to be our friend and when Valentine's Day falls on the first day of Lent, it is a good reminder to us of God's love for us and not just us, but the whole entire world! God loves all of us because God made us. We belong to God and God wants to be our friend-our very best friend. This is why God gave us Jesus. The Bible says that God so loved us that God gave us Jesus. Jesus shows us what God is like. All of Jesus' life (including the tough part about Jesus dying- and the wonderful good news that Jesus rose from the dead and lives even now) is a reminder to us that God loves us. # **Cast Your Net**



#### John 21:3-18 NLT

Simon Peter said, "I'm going fishing." "We'll come, too," they all said. So they went out in the boat, but they caught nothing all night. At dawn Jesus was standing on the beach, but the disciples couldn't see who he was. He called out, "Fellows, have you caught any fish?" "No," they replied. Then he said, "Throw out your net on the right-hand side of the boat, and you'll get some!" So they did. and they couldn't haul in the net because there were so many fish in it. Then the disciple Jesus loved said to Peter, "It's the Lord!"

Youth work can feel a lot like fishing. You desperately try to

be cool and create a space that you think is going to be right on the spiritual pulse of what God intends for a community of young people based on all of the experience and research you bring to the table. And even when you do everything right, things often don't work.

I hear a lot about how much of a gift it is to be able to relate to teens, but it is really not that hard. All you have to do is listen and love. And even those two "skills" aren't these lofty cerebral qualities prepared over time. All you need to do is be in the moment,

Our Pastor maintains a fund to provide emergency help to Trinity congregation members and friends in emergency need. Recently, we have


