On The Resurrection of Plants and Other Things



I know I've written about this before.

In fact, it was exactly this time last year.

I know that because the plant on my deck—the pretty purple one I bought in the summer 2 years ago—is now blooming again. When it bloomed again last spring—I was surprised. After that first season was over, I thought it was dead and simply left it on the balcony. Over the winter snow accumulated on it, rain pooled inside the pot and I thought once it thaws out, I'll get rid of it. But

I didn't. I left it right where it had been all year. And then last Memorial Day weekend I went away for a couple of days. When I returned- voila- all of the pretty purple flowers from the year before were back. I was shocked. I thought it was dead (or at best a weed was growing in its place). But I discovered that it was a perennial- who knew?

When this spring rolled around, I was ready. I even moved it into the sun this year to help it along.

And because it's been a busy spring, it was the only plant I tended to. Usually, there are more but this year the only plant that was growing (at least for now) was this one.

Or so I thought.

Until I noticed my 'plant graveyard'.

(Doesn't everyone have a plant graveyard?)

Let me explain.

Marty and I live in a condo unit and share the outdoor property with our neighbors. Because of this there isn't any designated place to plant outside. That's already been done with carefully manicured bushes and trees and maintained by the landscapers who come to take care of the grounds. It's all rather lovely.

And because we have no place to plant outside, I have, over the years, created a container garden. (Like a farm of plants). Every spring I line them up on the steps outside my front door and every Fall I 'dismantle' my garden by 'adding' to the vegetation outside. It was my contribution to the grounds. Sort of. You see it

was a bit 'wild', back before they carefully manicured the surrounding property (because it wasn't always like this). Large trees and wild bushes were allowed to grow at will. And so, I confess, at the end of the season, I would dump the remains of the plants back into the earth, and bless them on their way. The following spring I would begin all over again with new plants.

However, one fall, two years ago, they took out all of the wild plants making it a lot harder to 'dispose' of them at the end of the season. And so, I needed to find a new spot to deposit my lifeless plants and the place I found was next to the fence, behind a bush, in the back of our unit. The thought was that there they could simply (quietly) decompose back into the earth. And so, last fall, I dumped out the dead plants, brought the pots into the garage, and settled in for the colder months.

Well- those months went by and this spring came along again, but recently- I noticed something. Next to the fence-popping out through the fence

behind the bush- was an orange flower. First one, then two, then a whole bouquet of orange flowers. Next to them were little violas with their happy faces turned to the sun. And finally, the mint plant hidden way in the back (no pot- just a clump of dirt in pot form) was thriving with its deep green leaves ready to be picked for iced tea. It was amazing! Now, obviously, I'm an amateur at this and didn't realize these were all perennials. I thought they were one and done and I had left all of these for dead. In my defense, they were dead (or so I thought). They were brown and lifeless. And yet- here they were. Life springing up from death- once again.

But God is like that.

And this object lesson, provided by God, was obvious. Even to an amateur gardener.

Over the Easter season (which ended with our Pentecost celebration) it is this very thing that we celebrate. That life came out of a graveyard. That Jesus, who was left for dead- and along with Him buried hopes and buried dreams- rose up very much alive.

It is why we come together

to worship on Sundays. Each Sunday is meant to be a 'mini Easter'. A reminder of the resurrection. A celebration that life sprang up from death. Each Sunday we read scripture, sing songs, and pray. We tend to the garden of our faith and we remind each other of this core truth that, in Jesus, life came from death. That our God is a God of resurrection and new life and that this changes things.

But I wonder how often we relegate the truth of resurrection to Sunday mornings. As if resurrection were only a Sunday morning phenomenon.

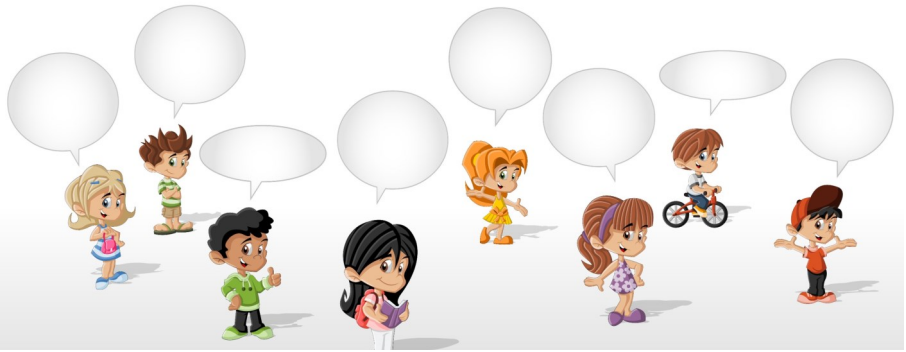
I looked for, expected, and tended to the new life in that purple plant on the balcony this year, but God surprised me (once again) by bringing life from death in a place where I didn't expect it.

Which made me think. Where in our lives is God bringing about resurrection where we don't expect to see it? Where we are not looking for it?

If we believe that in Christ there is healing and wholeness.

One day there will be the resurrection of our bodies and oh what a day that will be! But for now- on this side of eternity- let's be aware and expectant, and tend to the garden of our faith knowing that all the things we've left for dead God will most definitely bring to new life.

Self ~~Worth~~ Work

There are a lot of good things about this age of personal growth and care. In 2015, according to the Pew Research Center, more millennials reported making personal improvement commitments than any generation before them. They spend twice as much as boomers on self-care essentials such as workout regimens, diet plans, life coaching, therapy and apps to improve their personal well-being. We that are getting older can learn a thing or two about being intentional with such things.

“Who I am and what I need,” are mantras sort of ingrained into how young people regularly think of themselves and their place in their community. And there is a lot of good fruit to come from this in terms of facing trauma, addiction, relationship, illness, prejudice and beyond.

The problem comes when we realize that no one is without an idol. The Greek word *eidos* means “form, type or idea” and leads us to both ideal and idol. The two are very closely related. And then the question is who are we following? The quick answer might

be, “myself,” but not really. We are learning from somewhere. It is in our nature. And more often than not, the ideals and idols presented to us in media and pop culture are vacant. Admittedly vacant. And I am not saying this to put people down, but you will hear artists, athletes and even influencers say “I am not trying to be a role model.” Sometimes it seems like only the worst role models are the ones willing to own it.

So what is to be done about this? I think Jesus, as someone worth idolizing, would point to the plank in our own eye. For too long the church has abused power and privilege and caused a generation to recoil at the idea of self-critique. In the mechanism of the church it seems like this was the widget that kept people from speaking up, or questioning, challenging, etc. This is the role we played in the perhaps imbalanced amount of entitlement in our young people. The church as one of many authorities lost the right to speak and so people look to themselves because institutions can't be trusted.

I hear the way our brothers and sisters in our AA meetings

share their stories sometimes. Only pieces as I pass by, but the humility demonstrated is a blessing. A blessing that, for many of them, seems to have come at a cost.

Truly loving ourselves and caring for ourselves means being deeply honest. Humble. Reflective. Not just okay with ourselves. And we shouldn't rely on our own voice to soothe us. I don't think anyone is self-aware enough to give themselves the wisdom and love that they need. I certainly am not capable of it.

But the grace given by God's Son, and the promise that we are okay in the eyes of the Almighty then gives us the freedom to work on ourselves in active love, healing and growth. Jesus demonstrated His love through work. Love is work. Even the love for ourselves.

Self work is not selfish; you cannot truly work on another until you know how to work on yourself.

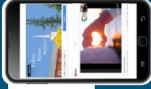
