THE PATH OF GOD'S JUSTICE AND MERCY



This is a reprint of the sermon from Sunday, August 17, 2025.

Our gospel text this morning comes from Luke chapter 12, verses 49 to 56.

Jesus said, I have come to cast fire upon the earth and how I wish it were already ablaze. I have a baptism with which to be baptized and what constraint I am under until it is completed.

Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the

earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. From now on, five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three. They will be divided, father against son and son against father, mother against daughter and daughter against mother, mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law.

He also said to the crowds, when you see a cloud rising in

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the west, you immediately say it's going to rain. And so it happens. And when you see the south wind blowing, you say there will be scorching heat and it happens. You hypocrites, you know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?

This is the gospel of our Lord. **Praise to you, oh Christ.**

Our gospel text last week opened with Jesus saying, "Do not worry, little flock." (which is lovely) And if you were here for that message, then you know it was about our deep longing for the sure promises of God, promises which speak to our deepest fears. ("Do not worry...it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom."

This week, however, just a few verses later, we have something very different. Instead of do not worry, little flock, we have Jesus saying, "I have come to cast fire and will bring division."

This then begs the questionwhat in the world is going on?

(As a side note- I heard from several pastors this week who said that this is the sort of passage that you assign to someone else for them to preach it while you go away on vacation!... Or...even better... perhaps skip it altogether in exchange for another week of Jesus telling us not to worry!)

Because the issue here is clear-Jesus calling down fire from heaven has, at least according to my husband, a very Dungeons and Dragons feel to it. It doesn't sound like the Jesus that we usually encounter in Scripture. In fact, if you remember, Jesus responded to James and John-specifically telling them that they could NOT call down fire from heaven-fire at God's behest, on the Samaritan village that rejected them. Jesus said, "No," as we might expect. Because contrary to popular belief, God does NOT deal in wrathful fire. However, the same Jesus that said no then, now says He has come to cast fire on the earth, and how He "wishes it

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were already ablaze." And it's important to look at this. Because if we only look at the texts that make us feel good, and there are lots of them, and omit those challenges we find in Scripture, especially in the Gospels, we may in fact miss the good news of Jesus' kingdom message entirely.

Our passage today, as it usually is, is part of a much larger teaching of Jesus as He is on his way to Jerusalem. If you follow it back, it actually begins at the end of chapter 11 after Jesus emerges from a rather contentious dinner with scribes and Pharisees, and lawyers. After they are finished with that dinner, Jesus goes outside where a large crowd is gathered, so large that they're tripping over one another trying to hear Jesus and get close to Him.

But, it is in that moment that Jesus turns to His disciples (specifically) and cautions them against the "yeast of the Pharisees", assuring His disciples that, in time, all will be uncovered and made known. Jesus exhorts them to trust God in all things. And as He is

doing this, a man from the crowd speaks up, calls out, and asks Jesus a question, or actually makes a statement, a demand. The man says, "Tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me"! And Jesus answers the man in a parable focused on the futility of hoarding wealth. And then turns back to His disciples once more and tells them not to worry that God knows what they need. Instead, Jesus says, "Seek the kingdom of God." That God takes great pleasure in giving His children the kingdom. And in essence, He's instructing them to lean into the longing we have for our Master to return and-in preparation- to be about the task of caring for what has been entrusted. To be watchful, be faithful, and waiting servants.

But now Jesus turns back to the crowd. And in my mind for this particular passage, I hear Jesus with a raised voice calling out over the crowd, which I'm sure was a little loud, saying: "I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already ablaze." And when we

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hear that, we most often think of destruction, right? Fire destroys things. But fire in scripture is often not about destruction. Remember Moses and the burning bush; that bush was not destroyed. Or the pillar of fire that led the Israelites in the dark of night. Or the fire that was to be kept burning on the altar in the temple. In each of those, fire was a

mark of the presence of God.

However, this isn't just an Old Testament phenomenon. We see this in
the New Testament
as well, right?
Where do we see
this in the New Testament specifically?
The day of what?

Pentecost, right? Yes, Pentecost. When the fire of the Holy Spirit came to rest on the disciples gathered in that upper room. But fire isn't just understood as God's presence. It's also understood as something that refines, that purifies. God's consuming presence purifies and refines. The fire of God's holiness changes

things. Not in the destruction of God's good creation. God doesn't do that. But purifying it, imputing God's holiness. A fire that is more about healing than it is about destruction. One that transforms everything in its path.

We have longings for God's kingdom, for Jesus' return, for all to be set right. But our longings only dimly reflect the

longing Jesus has for the fire of God's presence to dwell in human hearts on earth as it is in heaven. In the beginning of Luke, when John was questioned as to whether he was the Messiah, John said, "I baptize you with water, but one who is

more powerful than I is coming. I am not worthy to untie the strap of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire", with the Spirit of God's presence and the purification of God's holiness. Not about destroying, but about transforming-to be accomplished through the bap-

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tism, the dying, and the rising that Jesus will experience as he goes to the cross.

Jesus says, "and what constraint I am under until it is completed." And sometimes this (constraint) is translated as stress or distress. But it's less about the anxiety that Jesus has going to the cross, although I'm sure that's there; Jesus was fully human, and more about Jesus' absorption, His focus on the mission of God. Remember, at the very outset of this travel narrative that we've been in since the beginning of summer, it says in Luke 9:51, "Jesus resolutely set out for Jerusalem." Jesus is consumed with God's mission to bring heaven to earth, the kingdom of God in our midst.

And so Jesus asks the crowd," Do you think I have come to bring peace to the earth?" "Do you think I have come to bring peace to the earth?" Well...Yes, yes, we do. We do think Jesus has come to bring peace to the earth. And with good reason. We think that because it's in Scripture. In Luke, Jesus' birth is announced to the shepherds with the angelic song of glory to

God in the highest, and peace on earth, on whom God's favor rests,which is everybody. (God's favor resting on ALL of humanity)

Also, a chapter or two back, Jesus tells the disciples as they're going into the towns to spread the message of the kingdom of God that they're to go into the house and say," Peace be to this house, peace be with you." And then after the resurrection, Jesus appears to his disciples, and He knows they're freaked out, and He says, "Peace be with you." So yes, we know that Jesus has come to bring peace to the earth.

And yet, we know that the division that Jesus speaks of is already there. Jesus is already speaking to a people divided as to who He is, not the least of which we saw at the beginning of this whole teaching in His dinner with the scribes and the lawyers, and the Pharisees. The division is already there, right there in the crowd. Jesus is preaching to people, some of whom are out to kill Him. Jesus is simply being honest about that. It's not the

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goal, but it is what happens.

And the parables that Jesus tells illustrate that. One in particular came to mind, the parable that's only in Luke of the prodigal son, right? So if you remember in that parable, grace and peace are offered, but are met with division, unresolved division, as the older brother stands outside and doesn't join the celebration. The older brother didn't want to be part of what the father was doing. Because, in the older brother's mind, the younger brother should have been disowned after all he did, certainly not welcomed back. What about punishment? But that's not what God's kingdom looks like.

That's what our kingdoms look like.

And there's the tension. There's the division.

One commentator I read this week, I thought, put it really well. She said, "Jesus has not come to validate human institutions and values, but to initiate God's radical will." That's powerful. Jesus has not come to defend our way of life, our

institutions, the systems that we've put in place to make some comfortable at the expense of others. That is sin. Systematic sin and injustice are very real, and they will be judged, purified, set ablaze, and transformed.

And if those seem like harsh words, they are, because Jesus here is speaking both as prophet, we don't often think of Jesus like that, but as prophet and as Savior. And the greatest sin that the prophets of old spoke about was idolatry, specifically the ways that we worship that which we've created, including and especially unjust systems, over and above looking to God to lead us and guide us in paths that lead to life.

God desires that we give justice to the weak and the orphan, maintain the rights of the lowly and the destitute, rescue the weak and the needy, and deliver them from the hand of the wicked.

And you can insert any marginalized group into this because God cares deeply about those on the margins, all on

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the margins. The weak, the widow, and the orphan aren't meant to be understood as the only classifications, but they're to represent all those who are forgotten and oppressed by the kingdoms of this world.

And in God's kingdom, to demand peace at the expense of those on the margins is, as Jeremiah puts it, to cry peace, peace where there is no peace. And those that promise this sort of peace are false prophets.

There's another quote I read. It said, "the peace of God that Jesus inaugurates and bestowed involved the reestablishment of proper relationships of mercy and compassion and justice. And not all will welcome this peace plan because it will mean the complete collapse of current structures." This is why Jesus speaks of the division within households. That stings a little bit when you read that. It's uncomfortable- divisions between fathers and sons, mothers and daughters, etc.. Households, though, were meant to serve as microcosms of the society that was around

them. And so what Jesus is speaking of, the kingdom Jesus has come to inaugurate, even now, means the complete collapse of the structures we've created in exchange for the one that God has inaugurated.

"Oh mortal, what does God require of you? But to seek justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God." Jesus says to the crowd and possibly to our nation and our world today, "You can interpret the weather, but you cannot perceive God's movement?" The strength of Jesus's words needs to be heard, absorbed, and then, through the wisdom and the power of the Holy Spirit, lived out. Understanding that the strength of His words also offers the strength of His forgiveness and love poured out in abundance, with more than enough to go around.

May the mercy that we've been shown, upset the status quo of our lives, and set us on fire.





Greetings from the Trinity council. The Summer is coming to an end very quickly as our members and friends get in their last trips before school starts. We look forward to having everyone back on a regular basis soon.
