FROM THE PASTOR

LAMENTING FALL



I am outvoted in my house. As the air has grown cooler (ok-colder-it's downright cold first thing in the morning-let's just all admit that!) and the leaves have changed (ok, yes, those are pretty, but this is simply a signal that the trees will soon be bare!) my family has been happily rejoicing that summer is over and fall is here. They've broken out sweaters, flannels, and a decorative pumpkin has found its way to the dining room table. (Placed there by our resident Spanish teacher decked out in her festive bat earrings...think

Ms. Frizzle from *The Magic School Bus*.)

I, on the other hand, am not joyous at all because needing a sweater to stay warm is not my idea of a good time. (And I tire very quickly of 'pumpkin spice' anything). Also, it seems to me that fall is simply the mile marker on the road that points to much colder weather ahead. It points toward frosted car windows in the morning, space heaters needed in spaces that don't heat up fast enough, and ice! (And who likes ice? I certainly

do not.) But...all that said, the truth of the matter is that everything, quite literally in this case, has a season. Cue that song by the Byrds...

Everything has a season. (Is it now playing in your heads?)

"To everything,
turn, turn, turn
There is a season,
turn, turn, turn,
And a time to every
purpose under heaven
A time to be born,
a time to die
A time to plant,
a time to reap
A time to kill, a time to heal
A time to laugh,
a time to weep"

Fun Fact: Did you know that this song was actually not written by the Byrds? It was written by Pete Seeger during the time of the Vietnam War. And even he didn't really write the lyrics as they are taken almost entirely from the book of Ecclesiastes. (Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 to be exact).

Ecclesiastes is that book in your Bibles (in the Old Testament) that you may or may

not have read a whole lot. It was written at some point after the Israelites returned from exile. And unlike the song, we really don't know who wrote Ecclesiastes. The author refers to himself as Ooheleth, in Hebrew, which we have translated as 'The Teacher.' And although the author mentions that he is the son of David, we know this is meant more in a figurative than literal sense. Solomon, who was celebrated for his wisdom, would not have been living at the time Ecclesiastes was written. Instead we are meant to understand that just as Solomon collected wisdom, so does our friend 'Ooheleth.' Ecclesiastes is 'wisdom' literature (along with Psalms, Proverbs, Song of Solomon, and Job.) (Actually, Job and Ecclesiastes have a lot in common in that they both look at pain, suffering, and the seemingly randomness of life, in an attempt to make sense of it all.)

And, although it's a book I quite enjoy, I certainly don't blame you if you've found that this book doesn't quite reso-

nate with you. It's weird. Ormaybe that's an overstatement. Perhaps 'unsettling' would be a better way to describe it. Unsettling because Ecclesiastes pulls no punches. It's not meant to be uplifting. It's not meant to present a simplified view of life. It's complex and focuses on human limits and the absurdity of life. In addition, like the book of Job, it provides lots of room to interrogate God. The author seems to give the reader permission to spend time thinking about (and wrestling with) the tough questions of this human life.—Especially of a life lived in the knowledge of and relationship with a good God. And in all of the wrestling, one of Qoheleth's conclusions seems to be that there is nothing in our human lives that is new under the sun; it's all happened before and will happen again. And, from the author's point of view, he concludes that it's all pointless (It's meaningless), which isn't a sentiment we expect to find in our Bibles. How does this line up with the truth of God's good creation and

God's love of humanity?

This past summer, one of our Old Testament readings for the day came from Ecclesiastes (1:12-14, & 2:18-23). And on that particular day, one of our youngest readers had signed up to read. She got up, read what was in front of her, and upon reading the final verse: "All their days are pain, and their work is aggravation; even at night, their hearts don't find rest. This, too, is pointless." She turned around and stared at me as if to say: "So, Pastor, care to explain what THAT was about?

And in many ways, I cannot. It is, at best, complicated. And so, I wonder and wrestle with these questions right along with you. However, I think the foundational truth found in this wrestling goes back to that song—to that sentiment from Ecclesiastes 3—to everything there is a season.

One of the frequent words of Ecclesiastes is "vanity". This is also translated as meaningless, pointless, or absurd. The original Hebrew word that is

being translated is 'hevel'. Hevel means breath, or vapor, or mist. It points to something ephemeral. It's here one moment (perhaps for a season) and gone the next. It's like the seasons. Seasons found in nature, the seasons of our lives, even our lives themselves, and yet...in the Epilogue of the book, the author provides a solution (of sorts). He writes: "The end of the matter; all has been heard. Fear God and keep his commandments; for that is the whole duty of everyone." In other words, if you were reading this when it was written, be the Israelite you've been called to be. Live your life on this earth as the person God has created you to be, in relationship with the One who created you. Or translated through the lens of Jesus and the lives we live as followers of Christ: All of this will pass away, including all the questions, but One will remain. Cling to Him for He is faithful and steadfast.

Even this teacher, who was a collector of wisdom, could not make sense of life. He

strived for the foundational truth behind it all, and what he discovered was that, "human beings were not the power brokers of the universe, but were instead afflicted by hevel"—by the things that do not last, that shift, and are fleeting. And so through it all, his conclusion was the simple truth that our foundation, the goal of our lives, is to be found in God. That in the midst of all the questions of our lives, we are to recognize, follow, and cling to the One who does not change. Who is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Our constant in every season of life. Amen




TRINITY KID'S CORNER



YOUTH MINISTRIES

RADIATING LOVE AND THE POSTURE OF OUR PRAYERS



"Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love."

1 John 4:7-8

This week in Sunday school we read the parable of the persistent widow. In this parable Jesus says that God will answer our prayers for justice "quickly," and I played devil's advocate. I noted that there

were definitely times when Christians have prayed for justice and it hasn't come with any velocity that we would associate with haste. The young people noted two things. One, maybe God's definition of "quickly" doesn't match our own. And two, maybe what we are asking for isn't actually justice. God has stated that justice isn't up to us after all.

It is wild to me to be in a time right now when Christians

are so divided when it comes to the ways we are actually supposed to demonstrate God's love. I recognize that in the above passage the phrasing matches Jesus' words in John and it's a phrasing that might seem to pull us towards an interpretation that this love is meant to be exclusive among those "in the club." We might be drawn to think that Jesus, and John who echoes Messiah's words, is saying that if we make our "church party" so full of love, our gatherings so meaningful and our relationships so deep that others will see God among us and be drawn to that light. They will want to join our club. Maybe on some level that is true, but is it then really love if we don't let them in?

Jesus gave us an example of love that was about sacrifice. A giving of everything. Your shirt, food, your pride and even life if it is needed.

Jesus asked God the Father to take the cup from Him. In His humanity he wanted a way to reconcile Justice and Love that did not involve what awaited Him but He left it up to

God's reckoning.


We have a clear example of what Christ's love looked like, and so maybe we nitpick a definition for ourselves that feels a bit more comfortable, but we should be cautious of our caution. IF everyone that loves is born of God and knows God, then we might be surprised who we can learn from, and who actually doesn't know God because they don't love.

It seems to me that we should continue to scatter the seeds of God's Love freely and of course if that makes us uncomfortable or causes us to risk something even to the point of harm, then we wait on God's time to set things right, even if that takes awhile.

We need backpacks, buttons, small toys for kids, mugs and anything in bulk. Karen R, Andy, Fred and Ruth P. distributed blankets and sweatshirts in September. Thank you to all the volunteers including Kevin L., Barbara S., Page M., Cyndy T., and everyone else who helps keep the sharing room organized. See the Missions section for information about what is needed for Fall and Christmas distributions.

Jerry V. has been a great addition as our Music Director over the last few months and has been able to involve some of our youth and kids in the worship band on Sundays! Jerry is eager to put together a band for the Christmas season. We are looking forward to helping Jerry make our Christmas season very merry.

Cyndy T., our Treasurer, continues to report that giving so far this year has been lower than expected while our spending has been higher because of several bills that were not expected. We are running a deficit. As most of you are experiencing in your own homes, prices continue to increase for everything from paper goods, trash bags, paper and utilities.

Rich H. reported that repairs were made on the fire suppression system. Since then, we have replaced the hot water heater and had to repair a leak in the upstairs men's bathroom. Because of the age of the church building, we will continue to have repair and upkeep needs. We also must do mold remediation in the Manse bathrooms.

There will be a Trinity cleanup day on Saturday, 10/25, 9:00 am to 1:00 pm. Adults are welcome to come and help with clean up and repairs. Contact Rich for more information.

Mary C. reported that the Council is in discussions with Livingston Township about possibly leasing our parking lot to use for additional parking for their proposed open space park to be located on the property adjacent to Trinity.

Recently, a local Muslim group contacted Trinity looking for space for their daily prayer meetings and weekly service. After gathering more information and discussing this potential building partner with our current building partner the Taiwanese Presbyterian Church, a special congregation meeting was held on October 19. At this special meeting the members of Trinity voted to allow Trinity to lease space, on a 90-day trial basis, in room #8 every day for prayer at varying times, and Fellowship Hall on Fridays 1:30 - 3:30 for their service. As of the publishing of this newsletter, the lease has not been finalized.

The council will communicate any updates on this issue to the congregation in the weekly Trinity email. Thank you to everyone who attended the meeting.

Our next council meeting is October 26. If you have matters that the council should consider please contact a member.

Please continue to pray for Trinity, our missions, and church council that we seek to glorify God in everything we do.

local men in need. Please check the mission section of this newsletter for items needed for the Christmas mission.


