## FROM THE PASTOR

### A LIGHTHOUSE IN ENGLAND



My home office (also lovingly referred to by our family as the 'bonus room') recently got a "low-tech" upgrade: a wall calendar gifted to me by my husband. While most of us no longer use paper calendars anymore, this one features "wild weather." And, true confession, I love wild weather! Having received this before the new year, I had to force myself to wait until New Year's Day to hang it. Now, it sits right above my desk, offering a perfect view of the "storm of the month" while I work.

January's is one of my favorite pictures. It kicks off the new year with a dramatic shot of the Seaham Lighthouse in England. A lighthouse nearly swallowed by a massive, frothy storm surge set against a dark grey blue sky. And the contrast between this seemingly small lighthouse dwarfed by the giant wave was so captivating that I ended up down a research rabbit hole (of sorts) to see who 'won' the standoff. Good news - it was the lighthouse. And it looks like this shot was not unu-

sual. This little lighthouse has seen some weather. Built in 1905, this little structure has withstood over a century of North Sea fury. It's mesmerizing to think about something so small standing its ground against the elements for well over 100 years.

As I've been looking at this picture now for the past 2 weeks, I've realized how appropriate it is. Biblical even. I think of God's voice ordering the chaotic waters of creation, I think of Psalm 46 (my personal favorite)

*God is our refuge and strength,  
a very present help in trouble.  
Therefore we will not fear, though  
the earth should change,*

*though the mountains shake in  
the heart of the sea,  
though its waters roar and foam,  
though the mountains tremble  
with its tumult*

I think of Jesus stilling the storm (Mark 4:35-41, Matthew 8:23-27, and Luke 8:22-25) and walking on the waves (Matthew 14:22-33, Mark 6:45-52, and John 6:16-21). And Jesus' teaching about building on rock on a firm foundation instead of 'shifting sand'

(Matthew 7:24-27). Those are the ones off the top of my head, but you may think of others. However, the point of all of these is twofold. The first is that God is in control of the 'storms' of this life. Now, that can be incredibly comforting (God is the stiller of chaos), but it can also lead to more questions: If God is the stiller of chaos, why is not all of the chaos stilled? What about natural disasters (like the flood this past summer that swept through a Christian summer camp for young girls)? What about the 'storms' in our lives that aren't stilled? These are good questions, but, unfortunately, they are questions that don't really have answers. And so what really stands out to me from this calendar picture, and from Scripture, and from my own life, is knowing that even in the storms, we stand with Christ. That each of us individually and communally stands with Christ in all that we face. It is Christ who is our provision, our foundation, and in whom our identity is found, over and above any other identity we may wear. Whatever we've suc-

ceeded in or failed in pales in comparison to who we are in Jesus. Our true identity, our true foundation, our true home is found in Him, and the gates of hell cannot prevail (let alone wind and rain). And so, like the picture, the seas may rage, and we may feel their tumult, but like the lighthouse we are anchored.

For those of you who know Christian music, and specifically hymns, you may be thinking of at least 2 songs right now (I know I am ☺). The first is “My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less” which was penned by Edward Mote in 1873- a cabinetmaker who later shared the lyrics with a sick friend as encouragement, “...in every high and stormy gale, my anchor holds within the veil. On Christ the solid rock I stand: all other ground is sinking sand.” The friend was still sick, but the words (the reminder of the ground beneath them) brought comfort.

The other is “It Is Well With My Soul.” This one was written by Horatio G. Spafford, a grieving father who first lost his fortune in 1871 during the Great Chicago Fire and then, just two

years later, his 4 young daughters died in a shipwreck in 1873. “...when sorrows like sea billows roll; whatever my lot you have taught me to say ‘it is well, it is well with my soul.’” Some say this was penned as his ship passed over the spot his daughters perished on his way to meet his grieving wife, who survived. Others say it took a few years of wrestling with God before the words came.

These songs don’t mean that the authors (or we) don’t struggle, don’t cry out, don’t, at times, ask God for answers in our pain. But it does mean that even as we’re pounded by the storm, we are still well anchored. We are still standing on, found in, and protected by the One who is above all of it and yet right beside us.

I need that reminder at the beginning of the new year. Maybe you do too?

Peace to you in 2026 and beyond.

God makes us into an image of the divine and then gives us the capacity to be His hands and feet in the world, and all too often we deploy ourselves to push away, kick or run.
